The government has urged manufacturers and other stakeholders to work closely with the Tanzania Bureau of Standards (TBS) to produce goods with required standards for ease penetration of regional and global markets.

Permanent Secretary of the Ministry of Industry and Trade Dr. Hashil Abdallah made the remarks during the commemoration of the 2023 World Standards Day.

He noted that TBS has the mandate of supervising

the development and management of standards in the country adding that TBS in collaboration with various stakeholders has so far managed to prepare over 4 000 Tanzania Standards for various products and services in the country.

He urged citizens and stakeholders to participate in providing opinions in the process of preparing and making standards that meet the needs of the society.

Dr Abdallah said the commemoration of

the World Standards Day is one way of recognising global experts who make voluntary and mandatory agreements published as domestic and global standards to protect consumers' health and environment.

He said the government will continue to create enabling environment to business people and industrial owners in order to boost economic growth including management of standards development and quality of goods.

This move supports the government efforts to put friendly business environment, to improve coordination and management systems of the implementation of its plan, various strategies and programmes.

He said the industry and trade sector is one of

the important pillars in building the country's economy and contribute to gross domestic income because most of the industrial products are sold domestically while others are exported.

On his part, TBS Director General Dr. Athuman Ngenya said the standards watchdog recognizes stakeholders' contribution in developing standards with ultimate goal to protect health of consumers.

"These standards are those specifying safety needs, manufacturing requirements, the needs of consumption and measurements regulations. All these intend to improve goods and services offered in the country," He said.

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Get Quality Mark, TBS advises entrepreneurs

SMEs have been advised to take advantage of the government's programme to promote small and medium industries to come out in large numbers and acquire the Quality Mark which is being offered by the Tanzania Bureau of Standards (TBS) free of charge.

TBS Quality Assurance Officer in the Eastern Zone Mr Francis Moshy, made the call in Dar es Salaam when speaking at an exhibition organized by the Business Registrations and Licensing Agency (BRELA).

Mr Moshy said, "acquiring the Quality Mark will enable them to increase the quality of their products, find reliable markets in the country and abroad and produce products that have the capable to compete in the markets."

"TBS is responsible for registering and ensuring that all products produced in the country and those that come from abroad meet all quality criteria," he added.

Mr Moshy stated that TBS in collaboration with the Small

Industries Development Organization (SIDO) have started a program to ensure entrepreneurs produce quality products that can compete in the market.

For that reason, Mr Moshy said that TBS is responsible to ensure that all products produced by entrepreneurs meet the quality requirements, noting: "It is a must for any entrepreneur who produces products to get the TBS Quality Mark."

One of the entrepreneurs at the exhibition, Mr Werema Julius said he visited the TBS booth to find out how his food business could be verified to enable his customers to get the best and trusted products approved by the government bodies.

He said TBS officials instructed him on all steps to be followed to acquire the TBS Mark of Quality, so he thanked the management of both TBS and BRELA for organizing the exhibition.



We encourage all stakeholders to participate in National Quality Awards

Quality infrastructure is one of the key areas needed to contribute to the growth and development of investment, manufacturing and business sectors in any country. The use of standards, quality control, certification together with metrology services helps to protect the market for goods and services within the country but also improves their competition positions in the international markets.

Like other quality institutions in the world, Tanzania Bureau of Standards (TBS) celebrated the World Quality Week in November 2023. The week aimed at raising awareness of the quality management profession. This year's World Quality Week was themed "Quality: Realizing your Competitive Potential".

Addressing quality stakeholders at the climax of the commemorations of the Quality Week held at national level at the University of Dar es Salaam, the Minister for Industry and Trade Hon. Dr. Ashatu Kijaji revealed that the 2023 theme came at the right time for Tanzania, especially at a time when Tanzania had entered the African Continental Free Trade Area (AfCFTA).

Tanzania effectively joined the free market of 54 African countries with a combined population of an estimated 1.2 billion people and a combined GDP of more than USD 3.4 trillion after the Parliament of the United Republic of Tanzania ratified the agreement establishing the African Continental Free Trade Area (AfCFTA) on the 9th of September 2021.

According to Dr. Kijaji, AfCFTA is an opportunity for products and services offered by local manufacturers, but to achieve it in its entirety, the products and services must be of the required quality.

It should be noted that African countries aim to improve trade between them to eliminate the vacuum that is caused by the low level of trade between them compared to other continents. Data shows that trade between African countries is 16.6 percent of all foreign trade compared to 68.1 percent between European countries, 59.4 percent between Asian countries and 55.0 percent between the Americas. In her remarks, the Minister hinted that as steps are being taken to improve trade between African countries, it was good time for the nation to get ready to enter the African market; emphasizing that that would only be achieved if the goods and services produced in the country are of the required quality.

She revealed that it was for this reason that the Government through the Ministry of Industry and Trade saw the importance of establishing National Quality Awards and provided a coordination role to TBS and the Tanzania Private Sector Foundation (TPSF) in partnership with other institutions.

The awards are part of the Government's initiative to improve services and products produced in the country through the application of quality standards and regulations to public and private sector institutions to ensure that systems, products and services meet national, regional and international standards requirements.

The competition focused on five sub-categories namely award to the best company of the

year, best product of the year, best service of the year, best seller of the year (international), and the best individual who did well on issues related to quality standards. The five categories were raced into two main categories namely for large-scale companies and small-scale companies. However, there were no participants on the fourth category (best seller of the year) for small and medium enterprises (SME).

Winners of the 2023/2024 National Quality Awards will not only have the opportunity to be better known in the Tanzanian community about their competence in quality issues, but they will also have the opportunity to participate in the East African Community (EAC) Quality Awards Competition and in the Southern African Development Community (SADC) competition and thus, to gain exposure and expand markets.

The national quality awards were presented for the first time in the country in the 2020/2021 season where there was little participation. This year, the fourth season awards, the number of participants has doubled. However, the number is still low compared to the number of manufacturers and service providers in Tanzania.

We commend the government for introducing the National Quality Awards as part of a broader initiative to improve services and products produced in the country. Moreover, we call upon and encourage all stakeholders in product and service sectors to participate in the new National Awards season. This will give them a platform to showcase and brand their products and services, thus improving their competitive advantage in the market.

Invest in quality infrastructure to bring about economic growth — producers told

TBS Board Chairman, Prof. Othman Chande Othman urged producers to continue investing in more creative initiatives in order to perform well in the sector.

“We are happy to see people

competing well to produce quality and attractive products, we have seen major improvement every year during these commemorations,” he said.

For his part TBS Director General Dr. Athuman Ngenya said the commemorations of the World Quality Week has great benefits as it helps encourage and stimulate production of quality products to compete well in the local and international market.

Dr. Ngenya said that the Standards Body will continue monitoring and supervising to ensure that producers and service providers in the country produce quality products that adhere to all the requirements.

TBS Creates awareness in Mtwara Region

Over 6,000 people in Masasi, Nanyumbu, Newala and Tandahimba districts and Mtwara Mkindani municipality have benefited from training on quality and standards offered by the Tanzania Bureau of Standards (TBS).

Mr Paul stated that the registration of the premises is in accordance with the requirements of the law and not otherwise and explained about

the importance of standards in their daily lives including protecting the safety and health of users of the respective products and for producers, the standards guarantee reliable markets and to make the respective products withstand the competition in the market.

He asked manufactures and the public in general to ensure that they become ambassadors to promote quality in the communities they live in and provide information at any TBS office located near them or call

the TBS service centre in case they encounter challenges related to product quality issues during purchases.

One of the beneficiaries, Ms Halima Abdallah said that before the education, when she was going to buy products, the only criterion she was using was to check for price relief instead of checking if its quality was confirmed or not. Out of the 6,220 citizens who received the education, 158 are entrepreneurs who produce various products

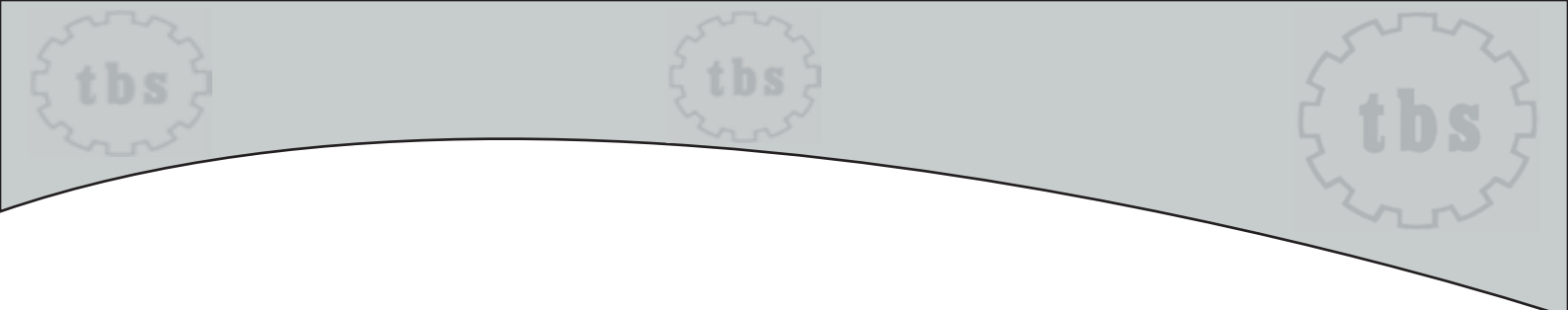
“Manufacturers in the country and the region at large can reap immense benefits by producing goods that meet the required standards including building consumers’ confidence,” he said.

“We also used the trade fair platform to provide education to entrepreneurs that they can

He explained that the certification services of goods produced by SMEs are done by TBS free of charge.

He said SMEs are required to get an introductory letter from the Small Industries Development Organisation (SIDO) and from there TBS starts the certification process.

TBS issues 145 licences, certificates to manufacturers

Tanzania Bureau of Standards (TBS) issued 145 licences and certificates to Eastern and Southern Zone manufacturers between June and November this year after their products complied to the relevant standards.



These include six Management Systems Certificates and 13 licenses to producers who had the TBS licenses but have added another product.

Out of the 145 licences and certificates issued, 60 licences and certificates were issued to Small and Medium Entrepreneurs (SMEs).

Speaking during the event held in Dar es Salaam in November, TBS's Director of Quality Management Mr. Lazaro Msasalaga hailed the entrepreneurs for meeting such important criteria to obtain Quality Mark that guarantee them access to regional and global markets.

"These certificates and

licenses reflect the producer's commitments since your products have met the required standards, so you are required to continue producing quality products to gain more confidence from buyers, thus guaranteeing a reliable market," said Mr. Msasalaga.

He added that the certificates granted to the manufacturers highlight the great impact of the entrepreneurial career classes conducted by the Small Industries Development Organisation (SIDO) which paved the way for certification.

He further explained that the event slogan dubbed "Quality: Realizing your Competitive Potential" is a reminder to producers to endeavor to

produce quality products and be able to compete in markets.

"As the law instructs on the production of quality products for final users, you should also take it as a reminder towards the quality products which will ensure customers' trust in markets," he added.

However, he further called upon producers who pretend to produce quality products for the certificate and later on continue to produce low-quality products that they should stop since they endanger the final user's well-being.

Tanzania Bureau of Standards (TBS) has been urged to put more efforts in conducting time to time inspections especially in the food and cosmetics premises in an effort to protect consumers' health.

Kaliua District Acting Executive Director Mr Gibson Milambo made the call during an awareness campaign by TBS in the district.

He said it's true that the Bureau has been undertaking the obligation of protecting health of consumers by ensuring that only quality products remain in the market but more efforts are needed to conduct impromptu inspections to remove low quality products from the market.

"You are doing a good job. However, I would like to ask you (TBS) to continue conducting



regular inspections especially in foods and cosmetics premises and be able to remove sub standards products,” said Mr Milambo.

At the gathering, TBS managed to continue with public education programme on the importance of checking products validity to enable and protect buyers from consuming expired goods.

Speaking during the campaign, TBS Public Relations and Marketing Manager, Ms Gladness Kaseka said the reason for undertaking the public education programme was to create awareness on the importance of checking product’s validity before purchasing.

“The awareness we are providing to the public will help the consumers to properly make good selection of products in markets,” said Ms Kaseka.

On his Part, TBS Inspection Officer Mr Magesa Mwizarubi insisted SMEs to buy and sell the

products that have and meet the required quality standard only. He also advised foods and cosmetics dealers to register their business premises to avoid disturbances.

Mr Magesa explained to the public on the need to understand the importance of standards in their lives as well as to entrepreneurs that the certification and registration services are offered free of charge.

He also encouraged the public to provide information immediately to TBS in case they meet incidences of counterfeit and expiry goods in the markets.

Through this campaign which was extended to numerous districts including Igunga, Kaliua, Sikonge, Uyui and Tabora, TBS managed to reach 5,615 citizens among them, 215 were SMEs.

Zuwen asked the participants to make good use of the training opportunity for the improvement activities in the salt sector while commending TBS for the good preparation of the training and asked for such kind of training to be continuous all over the country.

The training was based on the requests of the stakeholders through various meetings of the integrated committee to solve quality challenges in the salt industry in the country.

Presenters who took part in the training were from various government institutions namely Small Industries Development Organization (SIDO) and Tanzania Industrial Research and Development Organization (TIRDO).

The Pricey Consequences of Subpar Quality Assurance in the Manufacturing Industry

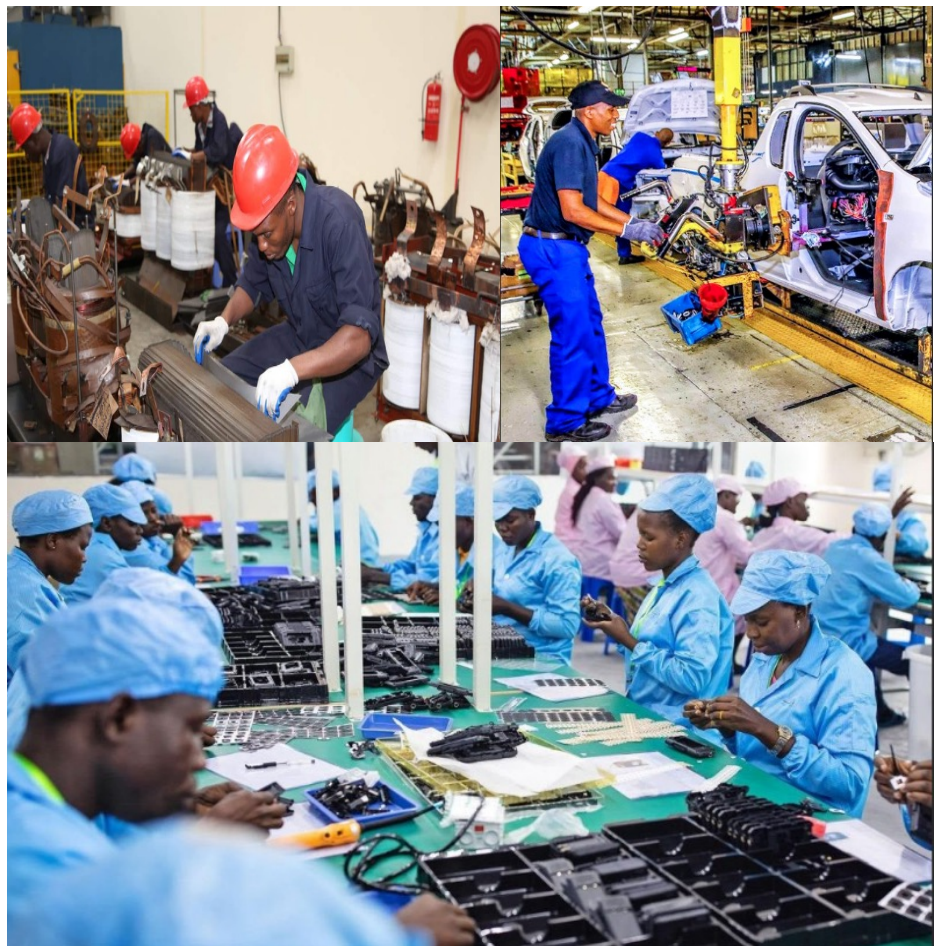

The importance of Standards in ensuring Food Safety

Global agricultural value chains have become complex, and food products are often grown, processed and consumed in different countries. While these trends have contributed to increasing the quantity and diversity of foods available to consumers throughout the world, with the increased volumes of traded foods, food safety risks are also increased.

Food safety has a critical role in assuring that food stays safe at every stage of the food chain - from production to harvest, processing, storage, distribution, all the way to preparation and consumption.

Unsafe food is a major social and development challenge and public health cannot be improved if the food reaching the consumer is not safe.

The World Health Organization (WHO 2015) estimates that more than 600 million people fall ill and 420 000 die every year from eating contaminated food. As for the economic price tag, according to the 2018 World Bank Report,

unsafe food costs low-and middle-income economies alone about US\$ 95 billion in lost productivity annually and also unsafe food limits its trade. The good news is that most foodborne diseases are preventable.

Safe food is a primary determinant of human health. It is a basic human right to have access to safe and healthy food. In seeking to guarantee this right, governments must ensure that available food meets safety standards.

Different food control measures have been developed to ensure availability of safe and nutritious food and standard is one of the major component in food control



system.

Standard defined as a document, established by consensus and approved by a recognized body, that provides, for common and repeated use, rules, guidelines or characteristics for activities or their results, aimed at the achievement of the optimum degree of order in a given context. Standards provide a reliable basis on which common expectations can be shared regarding specific characteristics of a product, service or process.

Tanzania Bureau of Standards (TBS) amongst other responsibilities to ensure food safety in the country, has the mandate to formulate, promulgate and implement national standards in different sectors including Food and Agriculture sector. Since its inception in 1975, the Bureau has developed hundreds of such standards and provided guidance for improving food safety and nutrition.

Food standards ensure food safety and quality by addressing all food-related issues such as quality and hygienic requirements, contaminants including toxins, heavy metals, residues of veterinary drugs and pesticides, hygienic practices such as Good Manufacturing Practices (GMP) and Good Hygienic Practices (GHP), additives, nutrition, food packaging and labelling and methods of

sampling and analysis. Management Standards such as Hazard Analysis Critical Control Point (HACCP) and Food Safety Management (FSM) System provide a solid foundation for food business operators to ensure safety of the food they produce across the entire value chain. Furthermore, Standards provides guidance on inspection requirements of food products.

To achieve food safety objectives, food standards should be based on risk analysis using the best, most up-to-date and robust scientific advice. For this reason, Tanzania food standards are risk based approach, relying on existing international standards such as Codex Alimentarius Commission (CAC) and ISO Standards, adopting risk assessment conducted and use of available published studies.

The principles enshrined in the standardization process work to ensure that food standards contribute in protecting public health and ensuring fair practices in the food trade.

Moreover, National food controls play a pivotal role in protecting the health of consumers and ensuring fair practices in trade. The Bureau regularly inspect and analyses food products for compliance with the set food standards.

Therefore, food producers are responsible to ensure that the food they produce comply with the requirements of the standards set to ensure safety and health of consumers and to gain market access. They should be aware of and understand the hazards associated with the food they produce, transport, store and sell, and the measures required to control those hazards relevant to their business, so that food reaching consumers is safe and suitable for use.

While recognizing that food safety is a shared responsibility, the World Food Safety Day should be an opportunity to strengthen our efforts to ensure that the food we eat is safe from production level to the folk.
